## Anniston Milestones/Facts

### Milestone Dates

- ◆ Chemical weapons storage began 1961.
- ◆ ANCDF construction began 1997.
- ◆ GB disposal operations began August 9, 2003.
- ◆ Concluded GB munition disposal March 2, 2006.
- ◆ VX disposal operations began July 23, 2006.
- ◆ More than 9,312,300 safe hours worked.


### ANCDF operations have safely disposed of:

- ▶ 13,440 VX-Filled M55 Rockets
- ▶ 0 VX-Filled 155mm Projectiles
- ▶ 0 VX-Filled Land Mines
- ▶ 6 VX Igloos Emptied
- ▶ 126,378 pounds of liquid VX (15,027 gallons)
- ▶ 142,428 GB-filled munitions (**0 remain**)
- ▶ 874,436 pounds of GB (96,246 gallons ~ **0 remain**)

## Leading the Way to a Safer Future

The U.S. Army Chemical Materials Agency (CMA) and the Anniston Chemical Activity (ANCA) are committed to the safe storage of chemical munitions and the safe and deliberate disposal of the entire stockpile in the Anniston Chemical Agent Disposal Facility (ANCDF) while ensuring the safety of the public, the environment, and all involved in the storage and disposal efforts.

- ◆ Disposal is safer than continued storage.
- ◆ Since 1990, more than 11,060 tons of chemicals and more than 1,735,800 munitions have been incinerated.
- ◆ Pollution control systems protect people and the environment.
